What **is** Community Energy?

Community energy covers aspects of **collective action** to reduce, purchase, manage and generate energy.

Community energy projects have an emphasis on local engagement, local leadership and control and the local community benefiting collectively from the outcomes.

Community-led action can often tackle challenging issues around energy, with local councils and community groups well placed to understand their local areas and to bring people together with common purpose.

There are many examples of community energy projects including:

Community-owned renewable electricity installations such as solar photovoltaic (PV) panels, wind turbines or hydroelectric generation.

Members of the community jointly switching to a renewable heat source such as a heat pump or biomass boiler.

A climate change/sustainability organisation or community group supporting energy saving measures such as <u>Cold to Cosy Homes Cumbria</u>

Collective purchasing of heating oil for off gas-grid communities.

Collective switching of electricity or gas suppliers.

What **can** Town & Parish Councils do?

Declare a Climate Emergency.	In a formal meeting, town or parish councils can put forward a climate emergency motion and do the following: Use the phrasing 'declare a climate emergency.' Set target dates for reducing their own emissions. State their climate actions to support them. Set up a Climate Action Group to act on their declaration, and provide regular updates to the parish/town council. Work out what the council and the community are most interested in working on. Think about what might have the most impact, but also what the local community will want to support.
Look at the existing powers of councils regarding climate change.	Existing Powers of Councils regarding Climate Change
Consider adopting the General Power of Competence and using innovatively.	The GPC gives councils the power to do anything an individual can do provided it is not prohibited by other legislation. An eligible council is one which has resolved to adopt the GPC, with at least two thirds of its members being declared elected. The Clerk must hold an appropriate qualification. (Parish Councils (General Power of Competence) (Prescribed Conditions) Order 2012).

Reduce your own Energy Use in Local Council Buildings.	Ensure any local council buildings are as energy efficient as possible, and that energy is not wasted through unnecessary heating and lighting.

Ensure any street lighting uses well-directed LED lighting.	
<u>Get an energy audit as a first step.</u>	
Install renewable energy generation, like heat pumps and solar PV. This could be on council land as well as council buildings, (eg a hydro or solar field).	
How to shape where you live: a guide to neighbourhood planning Promote renewable energy projects, such as solar energy & wind turbines in your Neighbourhood Plan.	
Take advantage of the grassroots reach of parish and town councils.	
Use your website, social media, posters, leaflets and word of mouth via your Councillors.	
Host a Community Engagement event about Climate Change and Community Energy.	
Share information from local agencies & organisations which support your communities to save energy.

You'll learn about climate science, where emissions come from and their impact on everyday life. You will also find out about the actions being taken to reduce them and the part you can play.

Zara Carban Cumbria - Community Climate	Organisations who apply must be based in Cumbria and must be locally controlled. Only not-for-profit groups can apply, including Parish Councils.

	Reducing carbon emissions including those relating to energy use.
	Engaging with more people and building knowledge and understanding of climate change within your community.
	Linking with other projects or activities which will help achieve the target of a Zero Carbon Cumbria by 2037.
	Small grants (£200 – £750) and medium grants (£750 – £2,000) will be awarded to local groups until 2025.
